The Law and Your Business—-All Risk Insurance Coverage

It can never be overstated that it is critical that you read and understand the coverage and exclusion language in any insurance policy you procure. It is also important to remember that the denial of coverage by an Insurer is not necessarily the final word on an otherwise legitimate claim for compensation by a damaged Insured. In a case decided in January, 2018, a homeowner's residence, covered by all risk insurance, suffered roof damage from a hail storm, and the homeowner (Insured) submitted a claim to its Insurer.

The Insurer maintained, among other defenses, that the damage was not from a hail storm but rather from wear and tear or by defective construction and design, both exclusions under the policy. The Insurer also argued that even if some of the damage occurred because of the hail storm, that the homeowner's claim was invalid because of the "anti-concurrent clause" provision in the insurance contract. An anti-concurrent cause provision is a provision in a first-party insurance policy that reads that when a covered cause and noncovered cause combine to cause a loss, all losses directly and indirectly caused by those events are excluded from coverage.

The court ruled under an all-risk insurance policy, that once the insured establishes a loss apparently within the terms of the policy, the burden shifts from the Insured and is upon the Insurer to prove that the loss arose from a cause which is excepted. Under Florida law the general notion is that an all-risk insurance policy guards against all risks **except** those explicitly excluded by the policy.

The court explained "an insured claiming under an all-risks policy has the burden of proving that the insured property suffered a loss while the policy was in effect. The burden then shifts to the insurer to prove that the cause of the loss was excluded from coverage under the policy's terms", and went on to hold that it was not Homeowners' responsibility, in the context of an all-risk insurance contract, to prove by a preponderance of the evidence that a non-excluded peril was the most substantial or responsible cause of the damage to the roof. *Richard Jones and Louise Kiernan v. Federated National Insurance Co*.


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INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS (CONTINUED)

Hiring and Safety. What is the relationship?

It's a well-known fact that new hires have a greater chance of having an incident or causing an incident than seasoned employees. There are statistic to prove that fact. Workers with six month or less on the job pose the greatest risk. What's surprising is that the experience of the employee new to a company doesn't shift the scale that much. Many employees, new to a company, are out to prove themselves and advance. They may take chances or bring bad habits with them. Some lack the skills they were hired for and some are just looking for a paycheck and will stay as long as someone doesn't come up with ten cents an hour more. The question then is, "How can we improve the chances that we are hiring the right person for the right job?"

It all starts with the hiring process. Interviews with HR supplemented by screening by experienced supervisors, back ground checks, testing pre-employment drug testing, resume's, referrals all can help refine the process but what happens next is going to determine how well the integration into the culture of the company will work. A good first step is to have an effective new employee orientation. Gone are the days when you can have an employee sit down for 20 minutes and watch a video and call it orientation. OSHA requires training in so many areas it's impossible to cover it in one video. The new silica standard is a perfect example. Last year it was confined space. Before that it was GHS or the newer SDS Right To Know process. That doesn't include ladders, lifting and rigging, trenching and excavation and so many other areas of what we do.

After the employee gets through training and gets to the field, some companies have adopted a way to identify a new hire by giving them a different color hard hat for six months and then graduating to the normal company colors as a sign of accomplishment. Another effective method for integration is to assign a mentor to guide the new hire on the jobsite and help them to acclimate to the culture of the company. There are many things a company can do to help in the process of hiring the right person for the right seat. No one wants to hire their next accident.
