Work Experience

Describe any work experience. How long did you work there, what were your responsibilities, and what did you do with your earnings? 1) Babysitting- I would watch 4 children under the age of 11 while parents were at work or out for the evening. I worked for them for over 6 years and I put my earnings into a savings account and kept cash on hand. 2) Carrabbas Italian Grill restaurant hostess- I took customers to their table, opened and closed the store, bussed tables, worked with a computer seating system, and I began working for them in April 2015 and resigned in April 2017. I put my earnings into my bank account and kept some cash on hand. 3) Julington Creek Animal Hospital- I was a full time kennel technician at a small animal hospital for one month before I departed for Australia for a study abroad program (2016). I maintained the cleanliness of the facilities, walked dogs, observed surgeries, and even took blood from a canine patient. I put my earnings into my savings account. 4) Currently serve as a paid tutor at SGU for the veterinary program. I also have an internship scheduled over this summer at St Bernards Animal Hospital in Jacksonville.

What has your work experience taught you? My work experience has taught me significantly about responsibility and caring for others. I have learned how to care for children and animals and be very patient with people of all ages. I have also learned excellent time management skills by maintaining an intense class schedule with extensive homework and labs, as well as a part time job while keeping my grades high. Specifically to my work in animal hospitals, I have developed a sense of what it is like to be a veterinarian and a business owner by experiencing other roles in a veterinary clinic while gaining valuable hands-on experience, only attainable in a real-life small business work environment.

Describe any extraordinary responsibilities you have at home or any information you think may be relevant for the judges to see. During the coronavirus pandemic of 2020, schools were forced to move to online learning. As a third year veterinary student, this was a huge hurdle, for most of our learning in this term is hands-on and clinic/hospital work. Once we returned home, it was left up to us to find our own work experience and hands-on opportunities/practice at home while in this situation. I applied for an internship at a local Jacksonville veterinary clinic for the summer and I got the job! So, I will be working as an intern at St. Bernard's Animal Hospital to replace much of my term 5 clinical work this summer. Although this may seem trivial to some, for the veterinary student world, losing this critical time during our third year to perform surgeries (spays and neuters) is something that affects our skills to move on to our fourth clinical year. Taking on the task of "at home learning" is a responsibility we unexpectedly had to take, but we faced head on. We had to change and reorganize everything we were used to and try our best to learn life-saving medicine and science behind a screen. Although the semester is about to end, maintaining a life back at home while studying doctorate level work since mid-March has been quite a challenge.

If you were running for President of The United States, what would be your platform?

President of the United States of America: A job of international recognition and an integral part of the American government system. The influence the President has on the policies of this great nation is enormous, impacting the daily life of all Americans in one way or another. If I were to become President, my platform would be centered around economic prosperity and how to help small businesses flourish nationwide.

First, my platform would focus on less government regulations. Government regulations create what is commonly referred to as "red tape" for many private businesses all over the country. This red tape is, in essence, hoops that businesses must jump through to fulfill requirements or comply with restrictions created by government regulation. These regulations ultimately result in higher costs, inefficiencies or conditions on production which hinder the ability of small companies to invest and expand. This deprived growth gives less people the opportunity for employment. The more unemployed, the more people rely on government assistance, and therefore the more the government has to tax people and companies to supply those unemployed people with income. I would try to eliminate much of these unnecessary regulations to give businesses more ability to invest, prosper, grow, and hire!

Second, I want this country to re-think its view on students going to college. Undoubtedly, college is an amazing opportunity to learn and further your education. However, the problem with many college degrees now are that they leave students with no actual skill set to prepare them for participation in the workforce. I want this country to put more encouragement and emphasis on trade/vocational schools once again. Trade schools are often overlooked in today's society, and yet they provide useful skills to people that are not prepared for or who may not want to go to college. Our schools have done a disservice by almost ignoring this segment of our population.

Vocational skills bring along a new job market with high demand and competitive salaries versus the low wage jobs many students are now forced to work because they leave college without any real world skills. Trade schools are also more financially affordable and schooling is much shorter than your four- year degree. This would leave students with much less student loan debt and bring them into the workforce sooner. I would not discourage students to achieve college degrees, but I believe our society should offer more options for career paths. I'd encourage more students (and parents) to open their minds to trade schools and the opportunities they can bring.

These are two of my most important topics that I would tackle as president and promote during the election process. Both of these would help achieve economic prosperity for all and help small businesses flourish.
